Trustees' Report

The Trustees for 2017 were: Mr G Lovegrove (Chairman); Dr R Chan; Mr A Law; Mrs I Morrison; Dr H Ngan; Prof J Nicholls; and Mrs M Wulfgram.

As described in our Ordinance, the Trustees are the body corporate of Union Church. The Corporation holds the church's property in trust for the purpose of a church: for the public worship of God; for preaching the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ according to the principles and usages of Protestant Christians for the sole object of spreading the knowledge of Christ; and for the instruction of children and adults; provided always that the Church shall accept as its primary standards the Word of God as witnessed to by the scriptures of the Old and the New Testaments, the Trinitarian Doctrine of the Christian Faith and the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper. A day to day function of the Trustees is to oversee the management of investments Union Church is fortunate enough to possess through the foresight and good stewardship of our predecessors.

The Church has two main investment funds: the General Fund and the Three-Quarter Century Fund. There are no restrictions on the use of the former; however there are on the latter. The Three-Quarter Century Fund was established shortly after the First World War, about 75 years after the foundation of the Church, and any income or capital can be used only for specified expenses and outgoings connected with maintenance of the Church's Ministry. In effect, the Three-

Quarter Century Fund is the investment set aside to ensure that we can continue to employ a Minister should we ever be unable to pay our way.

At the end of 2017 the market value of the General Fund was approximately \$16.26 million and of the Three-Quarter Century Fund approximately \$9.18 million, each showing a gain for the year of about 18.9%. The General and (Three-Quarter Century) Funds have gained about 19.1% (17.7%) in the past five years, and gained about 26.3% (23.6 %) in the past 10 years.

The Trustees objective for the two Funds continues to be to achieve long-term capital growth with a low to medium level of risk exposure. The two Funds are invested in Fidelity Global Investment (FGI) Fund – Stable Growth Fund (Class A), managed by FIL Limited. The FGI Fund is authorised by the Securities & Futures Commission and complies with Mandatory Provident fund Schemes Authority regulations and also meets the Trustees' criteria by having an asset mix of 50% equities, 45% bonds and 5% cash.

The Trustees do not have personal control over the ethical nature of the companies in which the church's funds are invested so they are not able, for example, to screen out gaming or other stocks they consider inappropriate for the church to hold. However, the Trustees note that Fidelity is a signatory to the United Nations Principles for Responsible Investment, a voluntary framework for incorporating Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) issues into

investment decision-making and ownership practices.

The Principles for Responsible Investment are consistent with FIL's approach to Corporate Social Responsibility. The ESG concept evolves from Ethical Investing which started many years ago when religious organisations questioned their investments in companies that did not align with their faith and began making moral choices about where they invested their funds. FIL's approach to responsible investment is as follows:

- always act to protect its clients' economic interests and to maximise their investment returns;
- actively integrate ESG considerations into the investment decision-making process;
- incorporate ESG issues into ownership policies and practices;
- seek appropriate disclosure on ESG issues by entities in which FIL invests; and
- be proactive in strengthening its links within the investment industries,

governments, regulators and exchanges around the world in order to determine the most effective ESG initiatives for its investment process and set out a clear marker as to its commitment to maintain a high ethical standard.

In 2016 Fidelity's ESG team actively engaged with more than 650 companies on issues such as governance and remuneration, board composition, capital structure and environment and social issues. They also voted at more than 3,700 shareholder meetings, voting against management in nearly a third of cases to protect the rights of investors.

FIL participates in the debate over the development of appropriate standards for responsible investment through its membership in the following forums:



In addition, Fidelity is a signatory to the UK Stewardship Code and the Japanese Stewardship Code.

In overseeing the management of the Church's investments during 2017, the Trustees summarise the situation as follows:

- a. the aim of the church's investments is steady growth and income with low to medium risk;
- b. the funds are managed by FIL Investment Management (Hong Kong) Ltd; and
- c. the funds are invested 50% in equities in five regional (worldwide) pooled funds, 45% in bonds in two regional (worldwide) pooled funds and 5% cash.

The Chater (Union Church) Endowment Fund is an endowment fund that is too small to be managed alongside the General and Three Quarter Century Funds. Invested in Hang Seng H Share Exchange Traded Funds (with a small amount of cash), the Fund was valued at \$99,561 at the end of 2017, showing a gain of about 23.8% for the year. No disbursement was made from the Fund to the Committee of Management which, in accordance with the Fund's Deed, is responsible for the use of any income.

The Trustees have been represented in redevelopment discussions (through the BUFF committee as reported elsewhere) by Dr R. Chan and G. Lovegrove with professional advisors on matters relating to tax, land matters, charitable status, agreements with the Developer and landlord of temporary premises, insurance and the reversion clause set out in the Church's Ordinance. On the advice of tax and legal advisors the Trustees have agreed to maintain control of the property up to the time when long leases for residential apartments are sold to third parties to pay the Developer's costs, profit and fees. The reversion clause in our Ordinance states that if we cease to use our premises (or any substituted for them) for the purposes of the trust outlined above for more than two years then instead the Trustees must hold the Church's assets in trust for the London Missionary Society in Hong Kong. The courts ruled (in 2016) that the implementation and completion of the proposed redevelopment and the granting of leases in respect of the flats/parking spaces of the proposed redevelopment would not trigger the reversion. All major Government approvals relating to the overall design of the new building having been obtained, the Joint Leaders and Trustees agreed a Development Agreement with the Developer which was sealed and signed on 28 March 2017 in the manner set out in the Ordinance. Appendices to the Agreement concerning a long lease pro forma and a management agreement for the residential apartments being sold on long leases are still being finalised in consultation between the Church's and Developer's legal advisors. Temporary premises were acquired in 18/F Sunlight Tower, 248 Queen's Road East and the first

service there was held on 3 September 2017. It is hoped to move back to 22A Kennedy Road during Q1 of 2023 or before. The Developer continues to remain positive and encouraging notwithstanding the considerable delays that have occurred. The Trustees wish to express their gratitude to the many members of the congregation who have so willingly contributed their skills and time and who have worked extremely hard to overcome the many hurdles that are part and parcel of implementing a redevelopment such as the church is planning. The Trustees remain confident in the proposed redevelopment which means that today's congregation can leave a church for many future generations that is both financially secure and can remain independent.

Committee of Management Report

The 12 volunteers who serve on Union Church’s Committee of Management (COM) are responsible for managing the temporal affairs of the Church, ranging from human resources and stewardship to legal affairs and property. In addition, each member of COM serves either as a liaison for one or more of Union’s ministries, or as the point person for a functional area.

This year’s COM members (with their responsibilities noted) were:

Grace Siu (Worship); Amos Lyso (Youth and Children’s); Jimmy Phua (Missions); Alison Middleton (Human Resources); David Runciman (BUFF); Peter Fishwick (Communications and IT); Drew Foster (Legal); Timothy Ng (Small Groups); Anson Wang (Property); and Simone Loke (Stewardship). Treasurer George Ding and Senior Pastor Greg Anderson were ex officio members were. Our officers were: Frank Proctor, Chairman; Peter Fishwick, Vice Chairman; Drew Foster, Hon. Secretary; Timothy Ng, Deputy Secretary; George Ding, Hon. Treasurer; Amos Lyso, Deputy Treasurer.

2017 was a year of new beginnings for Union Church, as we moved from the premises at 22A Kennedy Road to our temporary home in Sunlight Tower. With this step, we have embarked on an exciting new chapter in Union’s history,

which will culminate with our move to our brand new home in Kennedy Road some five years hence.

It is never easy to be forced to think beyond your comfortable routine, but it is invariably healthy; the move has led us to rethink everything from our weekly schedule of service times and our space requirements, to new roles and responsibilities. We have been humbled and blessed by the adaptability, understanding, and grace that our congregation showed during this process.

All of us owe tremendous thanks to the BUFF Steering Committee—Kay Ian Ng, David Runciman, Geoff Lovegrove and Rosanna Chan. Although COM, Trustees, and Deacons share ultimate responsibility for BUFF, these four individuals are really the ones who made a successful move and redevelopment possible. They have unselfishly given of their time and talents for years, working almost on a daily basis.

In addition, we are especially indebted to the indefatigable Patrick Wilson, who oversaw the Sunlight renovation and the preparations for the move, as well as Clive Whittington, our coordinator for the move itself.

The staff worked many long, difficult hours under stressful conditions to maintain Union’s service and ministry during this period without missing a beat. I would like to thank all our staff, including ministry directors, administration, and janitors for their dedication, hard work and professionalism.

The transition to Sunlight Tower was a constant theme running through COM's activities during the past year. In order to communicate plans for the move and our new space, and to listen to any questions or concerns, we participated in a series of three Town Meetings in April/May, and in making hundreds of "UCare" telephone calls to the congregation to discuss the move.

On the practical side, after the Development Agreement with Henderson Land was signed in March, we proceeded to finalize the contract with the building contractor for renovation of the 18th floor of Sunlight Tower into our worship space, designed by the architects at KplusK. In the autumn, we concluded the Formal Tenancy Agreement for our space in Sunlight Tower. The sanctuary was ready just a few weeks behind schedule, and we held our first service in Sunlight Tower on 3 September 2017.

A number of essential housekeeping details were completed during the summer. For example, our insurance coverage was adjusted to include both our new leased space in Sunlight Tower as well as 22A Kennedy Road. We also used the move as an opportunity to implement a much-needed upgrade of Union's IT system and security.

In the busy, chaotic first Sundays in Sunlight Tower, Pastor Michele's "yellow shirt brigade" of volunteer greeters and ushers brought vigor and enthusiasm to their roles, and a positive energy to Sunlight Tower.

We are blessed that attendance has remained strong across all services. As

we settled in, COM began looking for resolutions to the capacity challenges at Sunlight Tower, particularly at the 11:15AM service. Services have been added at 5:15PM on Sunday and midweek on Wednesday evenings, to provide more opportunities for worship. Although COM considered several additional locations in the Wan Chai area to supplement our space Sunlight Tower, we found no suitable spaces that were nearby and within our budget. We are blessed to have the Hotel Indigo just across the street, and this has provided temporary space on two floors for Youth's U-Bar and the U-Café services. For the present, Hotel Indigo remains the best alternative space, and the services there have quickly developed their own tone and personality.

Although many of our activities were focused on the move to Sunlight Tower, COM was busy in other areas as well.

It is important to use technology to enhance members' ability to connect with the Church, and we have begun live streaming our Sunday services in real time over the internet. A generous donation allowed us to add two new cameras in the sanctuary, to make a high-quality livestream possible.

In June, a Union Church app was launched to help us keep in closer touch with announcements and events, watch and listen to sermons and talks, and connect for prayer requests and small groups.

An online payment system was also inaugurated this year, so that for the first time, Union members may donate directly online through the Union Church website and the Union Church mobile app.

Committee of Management Report

John Jamison was confirmed as the new chair of the Missions Committee this year. His appointment caps a multi-year review of the Missions Committee's priorities and policies. John is well suited to this role, and we are confident that the Union Church will continue to be an instrument for the Lord's work through ambitious missions work.

During the past year, we said goodbye to two much beloved ministry staff — Matthew Fredericks and Hunter Purvis.

In addition, as a consequence of the move, we had to discontinue our Union Church playgroup. We thus sadly bid farewell to the playgroup staff—Cheryl Farmer, Ho On Yee, Annie Liu, and Sandy Yamaguchi.

But there were some cheerful new faces too. We welcomed Sum Cheung to the administration staff. Monte Peterson joined us in August, working on a part-time basis, to help bolster our small group and adult education programs. And we were very pleased that we could increase Pastor Michele's weekly hours so that she can expand her work in pastoral care, small groups, and other areas.

As I conclude my three-year term on COM and step down after my year as Chairman, I would like to express my appreciation for being able to serve alongside such a hardworking and committed group of fellow COM members. It has also been a great honor and privilege to work with the entire Union staff, especially Pastor Greg.

May the Lord continue to guide us and bless us in our work at Union Church.

This event was a wonderful launch to the new year for women and a great platform for several women's events and ministries. Additional ministries included two ladies **Get Connected Dinners** - *"Seasons of Life"* dinner in May with speakers Junita Dubois and Rev. Christa Von Zychlin, and fittingly

the all-girl teen worship band, as well as the fall *Wilderness Dinner* featuring Dr. Julianna Rotmeyer as speaker and Crystal Lo, Anna Rees, Christine Wu and Alison Lyso as flash mob worship team. Both sessions enjoyed homemade dinners, great fellowship and were well attended with 100 ladies each.

Easter Monday, a team of 19 ladies, after meeting for several preparation sessions, went to **Lo Wu Correctional Institution for Women**. There we shared the gospel through songs, stories and testimonies to 280 women and it was reported that 38 women responded to receive Christ as their Lord and/or rededicate their lives to Christ. What a blessing it was to have our multi-cultural and multi-lingual teams reached out and connected. Additionally, several women have continued with prison ministry and are facilitating regular bible studies and attending regular prison ministry training through HK Kun Sun Association.

This summer, with the leaving of Pastor Matthew, Anto and I fulfilled the annual Union Church outreach in **Mongolia** with Flourishing Futures. With a small team and



Additional highlights this year included preaching, being a member of the HK Christian Council Radio Committee, recording 10 radio broadcasts “Reflections”, working with UC colleagues to host Screenagers; and speaking at the Ecumenical Unity Service. Lowlights included bidding farewell to some key UC members, as well as to colleagues Pastor Matthew, Brenna and Hunter.

Prayer Ministry by Charles Caldwell

“Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful.”

Colossians 4:2

The Prayer Ministry serves to offer prayer and support to the Union Church family. We are committed to the power of prayer and encourage you to give our team the opportunity to pray for you. Our goal is to promote dependence on God through prayer, which is a key cornerstone in Union Church. The backbone of the church’s Prayer Ministry team is the Prayer Chain, with over 125 individuals praying privately via e-mail and over fifty people on the WhatsApp Prayer Group. Prayer requests or praise reports are sent to these groups who remember people in their prayers. The Union Church intercessors include people who have left Hong Kong thus the Prayer Chain provides global coverage. The Prayer Ministry team is experienced in listening and responding compassionately to anyone who has anything on their heart; be it spiritual, physical or something to celebrate. If you feel called to join the Union Church Prayer Chain please let us know. Throughout the year opportunities are held to learn more about prayer and become more effective at praying.

With the migration to WhatsApp, we have seen an explosive growth in prayer. In 2017, over 3,600 messages of prayer, praise and encouragement were generated in the WhatsApp Prayer Chat alone. This is more than double the prayers generated in the first year of the WhatsApp Prayer Chat and 1800% more than the e-mail medium in 2016.

This past year also saw the creation of Prayer Sunday – the second Sunday of each month. While people are always available to pray after each service, Prayer Sunday puts an extra push towards prayer on that day and we have seen many people transform their relationship to prayer.

Many prayer sessions took place leading up to the Sunlight Tower move. These took place in the old sanctuary and we also held two prayer walks. One of the last Sundays in the old building saw over 30 people participate in a prayer walk from 22A Kennedy Road to Sunlight Tower – the largest prayer gathering in recent memory – where we prayed not only for Union Church but for many neighbours and critical needs between Mid-Levels and Wan Chai topped off with prayer sessions inside Sunlight Tower before the move. Intercessors carried little stones from 22A Kennedy Road that will be “prayed back” to our new church in several years. Last but certainly not least, a final prayer session was held in the old sanctuary in the final hours before the doors were closed and keys handed over to the developer.

We prayed praise over the miracles, prayed compassion over the deaths and prayed the Lord’s will over everything in between. We have seen little prayers emerge out of the Children’s Ministry, popcorn prayers emerge out of the Youth Group, and a waterfall of prayers emerge out of our Prayer Team.

Some news about my team: after serving for a year as Assistant Youth Director, Hunter Purvis left HK in September to go back to the U.S. His position has not been filled yet. Justin Cheong replaced Sarah Nutland as Youth Intern in the summer. Justin is also leading the Youth Band and helping me with some administrative tasks. It was my second year as Youth Director at Union Church: still many things to learn, but I am slowly seeing the results of the seeds planted the year before.

YOUTH MINISTRY

2017 was a year of transition for our Youth Group with the move to our temporary location in Sunlight Tower. Overall, the move went smoothly for the Youth Group. The youth are excited about gathering in a very modern building in the middle of such a vibrant neighborhood.



2017 was an exceptional year for our Confirmation Program, with 17 youth confirmed and 11 baptized.

During the year an average of 32 youth came for our Friday Youth Group, and 11 came for our Sunday Youth Group. This is slightly below our 2016 numbers, but higher than 2015.

In terms of Missions, our Youth Group participated in several local initiatives with partnered organizations (HOLF, Love21, Impact HK) and travelled abroad for our two annual Mission Trips:

- Cambodia in April with FCOP International
- Philippines in October with Kids International Ministries (KIM)

Union Youth Group would not exist without our faithful group of adult volunteers who willingly give their time and energy every week to educate and connect with our youth. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them from the bottom of my heart for their incredible ministry.



YOUNG ADULTS

Young Adults Ministry was a little bit slow this year, with a few sporadic events organized by Assistant Pastor Matthew Fredericks before his departure in June.



My wife Jess and I started a small but encouraging new initiative for Young Adults: a weekly dinner for Young Adults aged 18-35 years-old on Wednesday night in Sunlight Tower. An average of 11 Young Adults joined for the month of December, including Young Adults from other international churches. Dinners provide a time for Young Adults from different backgrounds to come together and engage in healthy discussion over a meal.

I am looking forward to 2018 for Young Adults at Union Church. Our new location at the heart of Wan Chai has injected huge potential into the Young Adults Ministry!

Children's Ministry by Jacklien Lee



2017 was filled with lots of great memories at both 22A Kennedy Road and Sunlight Tower. We are thankful to God for His blessings and His continuous guidance and provision throughout the year for Children's Ministry and our Kingdom Kids' families.

This year, Children's Ministry continues on with our mission to *"Train up a child in a way he should go and when he is old, he will not depart from it"* and by His grace we continue to grow in faith for the Christ's kingdom.

Our Children's Ministry programs are divided into three sections. The first is our core program - the Sunday School program, second is the Family-based events and third, the community outreach programs. All three sections are inter-related. Through our Sunday School program, children learn about Jesus and experience the love of Christ through Bible-based lessons and fun activities. Furthermore, we introduce our children the love of praise and worship in our Kids Worship Time. The Sunday School offerings collected through our worship session from September 2016 to June 2017

was amounted to HK\$29,405.30 and the children collectively decided the offerings to go towards supporting HK SPCA.

For our Family-based events, we organized events such as Easter Sunday activities, Mom's Date, Dad's date and our highlight annual family event - "Hallelujah Party". This year's Hallelujah Party was a collaboration between Union Church and Methodist International Church (MIC), where MIC generously provided the venue and Union organized the event.



The year we'd also witnessed the largest number of graduates (25 kids) in our Sunday School that moved on to our Youth Program. We are very proud of our graduates and their families for their dedication to God and their Sunday School. We want to bless them and cover them in our prayers as they continue to seek a closer relationship with Christ and also with their peers.

During the summer, we organized a Vacation Bible Study (VBS) titled “Fun Factory”, where the children learned that they are all created so wonderfully complex with their own special abilities and God’s love for them is unconditional.



In the winter, we organized our much-loved Children’s Christmas Musical, it is the third year running that we collaborated with the Christian Production Theatre company, Dove Tales Theatre Co. We are so proud of our children who were amazing throughout the whole production and we are also thankful for the full support that we received from all the parents.

Children’s Ministry also instill in children to love and respect others, especially for those in need. One of the ways to achieve this is by encouraging kids and their families to take part in our community outreach program. We have organized 3 community outreach this year, first was through partnering with Hong Kong Church Network for the Poor by filling over 200 PEACE BOXES for the under-privileged families in Hong Kong. We are so proud of the Union Church’s community eagerness

in supporting this PEACE BOX campaign. Second, we organized a mini Christmas Musical at the Home of Loving Faithfulness (HOLF), where 40 people made up of adults and children lovingly performed a Christmas Musical for the residence and staff of HOLF. Lastly, Children’s Ministry organized a Christmas program for about 30 children from the St. Barnabas Home & Society Kids Program.



We would also like to take this opportunity to thank our dedicated Children’s Ministry staff, past and present, namely **Priskilla Fachruddin, Michelle Borgeest and Ganga Suduwelikanda**. We are grateful to our Worship leaders, Sunday School teachers, faithful event volunteers and many others who have spent their time, energy and love in helping us raise our children for God’s Kingdom. We give thanks and praise the Lord for all of these dedicated and awesome volunteers. Children’s Ministry is truly thankful for their heart of service and we are eternally grateful.

We want to commit our Children's Ministry and all of our families, staff and volunteers in God's hand in the year of 2018, that God will use us mightily to share the love of Christ and the great news of salvation through Jesus Christ with others and most importantly to make Christ the center of our lives and our Children's Ministry. It is our prayers that Kingdom Kid's families will continue to grow together in their faith in Jesus Christ.

Patrick Wilson continues to lead Alpha and he and his wonderful wife, Jane are about to start a marriage class. Tricia Neil, the President of Alpha International, was through Hong Kong and thanked Union for our financial support of Alpha around the world.

Chris Yorks continues to find and train musicians to man the growing number of Union services. We thank Forrest Morr and his choir, who faced a challenging year with key members opposing the move. The love and charity they've showed toward dissenters was Christianity at its best.

The Missions Committee found a new head in John Jamison. The resulting committee, with old and new members, watches over a strategic part of our evangelistic efforts. Well done!

Alpha by Patrick Wilson



We started off 2017 with “The Jesus Lifestyle” course which was a follow up to the previous Alpha. This time we covered the second part of the series based on the Sermon on the Mount. After that, due to the work involved in planning and fitting out the temporary Union Church premises in Sunlight Tower, we were unable to run a Spring Alpha course. However, in September, following the move, we began our first Alpha in Sunlight Tower. It was a challenge getting used to our new premises, such as not being able to cook our own food on site (in order to comply with one of the building lease conditions). Still, we managed by ordering in more food despite the vagaries of Foodpanda in delivering food on time, or delivering it at all!

The Autumn Alpha course was relatively small with just two groups. However, this led to a greater intimacy between guests and leaders than might otherwise have taken place. Once more, we went to Tao Fong Shan for our Away Day and we were blessed by the Holy Spirit’s presence amongst us.

During the year, Tricia Neill, President of Alpha International, spoke at an Alpha International Partners dinner in Hong

Kong bringing us up to date with Alpha worldwide. In November, Rev. Nicky & Sila Lee, Associate Vicar of HTB, spoke at a dinner about the latest developments with “The Marriage Course”, one of which is the 2 year programme to re-film the complete course.

Looking forward to 2018, we are planning to run HTB’s “The Marriage Course” in the spring followed by another Alpha Course later in the year.

Many thanks to our Core Team members, group leaders and helpers, church staff and food donors who helped so much with Alpha last year. Finally, we thank God for his faithfulness and give Him the glory for all He has done and continues to do through the Alpha ministry.



Missions by Missions Committee

Missions at Union Church encompasses our ministry to the world beyond our church walls and congregation, including Hong Kong (Local Missions) and the rest of the world (International Missions). Union Church takes part in missions financially through our Missions Fund, special offerings, and designated giving, and through the hands and feet of our members and staff. In line with Union's overall work to encourage, evangelise, and educate, Union's missions work is based on our biblical commission for compassion (Matthew 9:36-38), evangelism (Matthew 28:18-20), and discipleship (Ephesians 4:11-13).

COMPASSION



Compassion ministries at Union are those ministries to share Christ's love with the world, often providing material and educational support to those who might not otherwise encounter God's love and care. Locally in Hong Kong, the church and its members continued to lead and support impactful compassion ministries such as

serving meals to the elderly, engaging with disabled children, and painting a mural at the Home of Loving Faithfulness. Internationally, the church took part in building projects and care for the needy in Cambodia, Mongolia, the Philippines, and Mainland China.

EVANGELISM

Evangelism ministries at Union are those ministries to fulfil the Great Commission of Christ. Locally, Union continues to support Alpha both financially and through our labour, as well as Chung King Ministries, Inner City Ministries, and outreaches to men's and women's prisons with the HK Christian Kun Sun Association. Internationally, we have continued our long-term partnerships on church plants and evangelism including Light of the World Church in Myanmar, Foursquare Children of Promise in Cambodia, and the Sogod Christian and Missionary Alliance Church in the Philippines.



DISCIPLESHIP




Discipleship ministries at Union are those ministries to equip the body of Christ for service, either as lay or ordained workers.

Evangelise

In Hong Kong, we support and take part in discipleship ministries such as the Filipino Fellowship CNY Conference, training programs offered by Youth with a Mission, and the enormously strategic scholarships to the Hong Kong Lutheran Theological Seminary students from developing SE Asian countries. Internationally, we supported discipleship through financial support of Asian Development Ministries (SALT) and the Shekinah Alliance Bible College in the Philippines and a bridge-building visit by church members to the Union Theological Seminary in Guangzhou.

GOVERNANCE

In 2017, Union Church gave approximately 12% (\$1,449,524) of our overall church budget to missions through the Missions Fund. Missions Fund partners have been vetted by the church and most projects involve Union members and staff as volunteers or leaders. The Missions Fund was also supplemented by a generous gift of \$200,000 from City Church and \$223,133 carried over from 2016. Special offerings raised \$94,029 for the Hong Kong Church Network for the Poor and SAT-7 Academy. Amazingly, individuals also gave \$1,155,149 to missions partners through designated giving, nearly as much as the Missions Fund. In 2017 the Missions Committee began implementing the decisions from the 2016 agreements by the Joint Leaders to clarify our responsibilities and policies, including the approval of our new Union Church Policies for Missions. We also enhanced our financial oversight by conducting new analysis of our past giving and a more detailed financial planning for the coming year.

years. I would like to say a very special thank you to Mr. Lawrence Kotwall who has faithfully and sacrificially served on it for over 20 years.

Please join me in welcoming Mr. Anson Wang as the new chairman. We pray for God's continued protection for his service at Sunlight as well as his preparation for our return to our permanent home back at 22A in a few years' time.

Most importantly, I would like to thank God for loving, guiding and protecting Union all these years! It is His mighty hand that has brought us thus far.

Treasurer's Report

Financial Highlight


Union Church strives to be a good steward of financial resources entrusting by our congregation. We are grateful to report positive financial results in a year of transitioning to our current premise at the Sunlight Tower. The General Fund, our main operating fund, records a surplus of \$5.3 million. This reflects \$2.7 million surplus from operating activities and \$2.6 million from investment return. The net asset of the church has increased 37.6% from the last year's and stands at \$36.2 million as the end of 2017.

Revenue

Thanks to our Lord's abundant blessings and your generosity, we receive \$13 million in General Fund offering, with an additional \$2.1 million revenue generated by various Church operated programs. In addition, we receive designated offering of \$2.3 million to missions and ministries that are supported by Union. Our General Fund offering was 19% above our goal in 2017 and 1% higher from the actual last year.

The breakdown of general fund revenue is as follows.

Total Revenue: \$15,124,523





Expenses

Thanks to the CoM's leadership and church staff's diligence, the actual expenses are 5.2% below the budgeted amount and 6% lower from actuals in 2016. This reduction mainly reflects a lower staff headcount this year.

The breakdown of general fund expenses and comparisons to budget and prior year's actual are as follows (HK\$ in thousands).

BUFF and Redevelopment Reserve Fund

The Building Union for the Future (BUFF) project has reached a major milestone this year. The Church relocated to Sunlight Tower and started first worship service there in September.

The joint-leadership authorized a fund-raising campaign for this phase of the BUFF project. A fund-raising committee was convened by Mr. Roy Huang (until February 2017) and by Mr. Kay Ian Ng (through the conclusion in October). The Committee of Management authorized the Treasurer to open a new bank account with Bank of East Asia for receiving BUFF related donations. All these donations are recorded with Redevelopment Reserve Fund.

Thanks to our God's unending blessings and your generosity, the campaign raised HK\$9,012,014, which covered all of the design, construction and moving costs of the Sunlight Tower premise. BUFF related expenses incurred is HK\$8,084,258 in 2017. The balance of the Redevelopment Fund stands at HK\$3,713,010 as of December 31, 2017.


A Brief History

Union Church was founded in 1844 by the Rev. James Legge, a Scottish member of the London Missionary Society. Then known as Union Chapel, the first building was constructed in 1845 on Hollywood Road. An English service was held in the morning and a Chinese service in the afternoon.

Legge served as Pastor from 1844-1867 and from 1870-1873. He translated the Chinese classics into English and the Bible into Chinese. His translations are used to this day and are still in print. He was a major figure in early Hong Kong and the founder of the very first government school (now called Queens College). The Legge Lectures have been named in memory of James Legge.

In 1866, Union Church relocated to a new site on




The Rev. Dr. James Legge

Stanton St. near Hollywood Road and Lyndhurst Terrace. It was called “the handsomest building in the colony.” In 1873, Dr. Legge returned to the UK where he became Oxford’s first Professor of Chinese.

In 1890, the Church was moved stone by stone to the present Kennedy Road site. Meanwhile the Chinese service became a sister church, Hop Yat, which has produced over 1000 daughter churches. Union’s only daughter church is Kowloon Union (1924).

The Japanese occupation of Hong Kong during WWII saw the forced closing of the Church. The events surrounding its total physical destruction remain a mystery. (The most intriguing thesis is that the Church’s wooden beams were used to rebuild the Japanese tower in Government House especially.)

The survivors began fund-raising and the existing Fellowship Hall was built in 1949, then used for worship until the sanctuary

was finished in 1955. The education annex was built in 1970 and later named after the Rev. Dennis Rogers, perhaps the most significant 20th century Union Church pastor, following his death in 1977.

In recent years, the Church has changed from a predominately European expatriate congregation to a church that is 60% Asian.

It has gained a reputation for strong lay leadership and launching new ministries (Alpha, Emmaus) that have greatly blessed the wider community.

Gregory Anderson, arriving in 2007, is Union's 21st senior pastor. Michele Bland is Union's 3rd associate pastor; and Ruth Tablada is the 1st pastor to the Filipino fellowship.

Union Church has matured from a ministry of the London Missionary Society to an independent congregation. Three bodies govern the Church: The Deacons' Court, Committee of Management, and Trustees. A

charter member of the Hong Kong Christian Council and active in the Network of International Churches, Union faces the future with a firm sense of its founding charter.

After twenty years of groundwork, the church moved from 22A Kennedy Road to a temporary location at Sunlight Tower, 248 Queens Road East, Wan Chai. The Kennedy Road will be redeveloped in collaboration with Henderson Land. There will be a beautiful new free-standing sanctuary as well as a tower with church offices and residential flats. This will be the third church on the Kennedy Road site.

But with all the change, our purpose remains the same. It was reflected in a document first written by James Legge in 1849:

“We differ in small matters, we agree in great realities. We trust that we are one in Christ Jesus. We all love Him who died for us. On the fact of this great unity, our Union as a church is based.”

Building Union for the Future by The BUFF Steering Committee

“Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labour in vain” Psalm 127:1

After two decades of planning, debating a number of re-development or extension options for more space, seeking the Lord’s will, and overcoming one obstacle after another, 2017 was the year in which we finally committed to, and embarked on, the re-development of Union Church’s 22A Kennedy Road site.

In January, we started the year by signing a tenancy agreement for 18th Floor, Sunlight Tower. Sunlight Tower would only sign a long-term tenancy. At that time, we had yet to finalize our development agreement with Henderson and therefore if the development agreement did not materialize, Henderson would not want to keep paying rent at Sunlight Tower for the long term. We negotiated a clause that entitled us to terminate the tenancy if the development agreement was not signed by the end of March. Thus we had to race against time to agree and sign a development agreement. Frantic negotiations ensued and we signed the development agreement with Henderson with just three days to spare!

The period from April to August was extremely hectic. Several work streams progressed at full speed. First was the renovation and fit out of Sunlight Tower. It was a challenging task to fit it out tastefully so as to be attractive and conducive to worship, to cater for everyone and all activities in a place much smaller than 22A Kennedy Road, and to keep within a constrained budget. Again, this was achieved “just in time” before we vacated Kennedy Road, and within our budget too. Secondly, the relocation committee was also in full swing preparing for the move. Every item had to be considered whether it was to be moved to Sunlight, stored for the new 22A or disposed of. The move had to happen with military precision during the weekdays of one week so that Sunday services before and after the move were not affected. The third work stream was fundraising. We kicked off a fundraising campaign aiming to raise \$10 million. Of that amount, \$5 million was to cover the fit out cost of Sunlight Tower. The

remainder was to cover professional fees (primarily architectural design fees for the new 22A and Sunlight Tower and legal fees to advise the church on legal issues and documents relating to the re-development incurred over a number of years), moving and storage costs, communication costs and other miscellaneous items. By year end, we were very thankful to have raised \$8.1 million. Any further donations in the coming year will be gratefully received.

At the end of August, we had our last service at 22A Kennedy Road before moving to Sunlight Tower. Grand plans were made for the final Sunday services. Alas, the typhoon intervened such that the Sunday morning services could not be held. We had to change our plans at the very last minute. The typhoon cleared in the early afternoon. That enabled the entire church body to squeeze into the sanctuary at Kennedy Road for a combined, emotional and unforgettable farewell evening service.

September saw the new beginning of our church life based at Sunlight Tower. As expected, there were teething issues to sort out but, overall, the move was smooth and as good as can be expected. We also handed over the 22A site to Henderson who have started preliminary development works.

December was a tense month. The Antiquities and Monuments Office (AMO) sat to hear an application from someone to have our buildings at 22A Kennedy Road declared as a Class 1 monument deserving of preservation against demolition. The AMO upheld their previous decision to categorize our building as Class 3 (for which certain artefacts and photographs were preserved). After that decision, we then obtained our demolition consent just before Christmas and look forward to construction works beginning in 2018.

The BUFF Steering Committee wishes to thank everyone who contributed to the re-development efforts in 2017. Most importantly, we thank God for His guidance and leading the way.
